Thin, light pencil lines applied to draw shapes. Outlines of shapes drawn are neat and refined. Wide/Good/Moderate variation of lines used to demonstrate texture. High/Good/Moderate level of detail recorded. Variation of pencil pressure used to represent the tones in the image.
