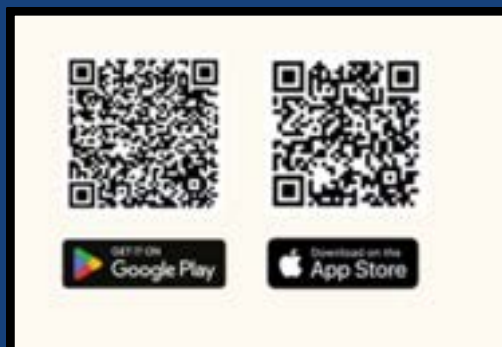
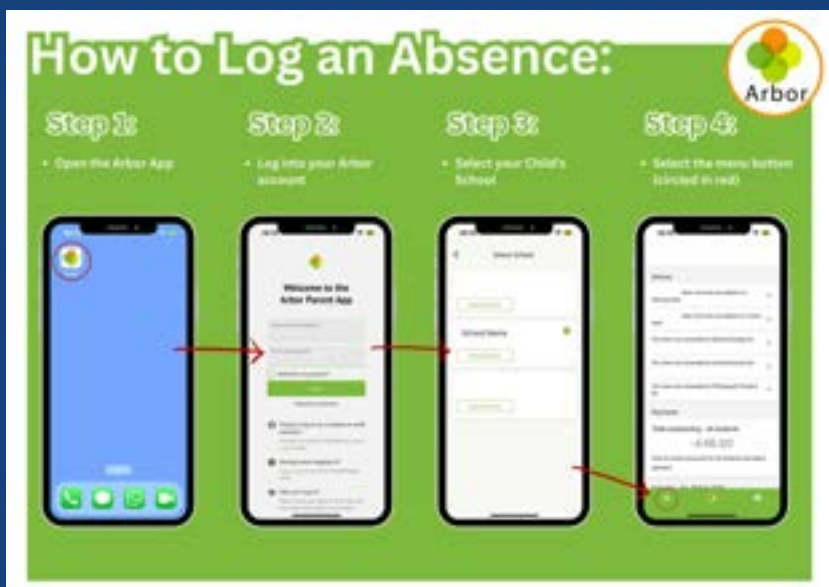

Curriculum



Our Animal Care students have taken their first exciting step into zoo-based learning with a trip to Holmes Chapel Zoo. After weeks of classroom preparation on animal welfare and handling, the group were able to put their knowledge into practice with a range of fascinating creatures. The focus of the day was reptiles and invertebrates. Students worked their way up from handling small snakes to supporting a 5kg boa constrictor, which quickly became a group favourite. They also practised using snake hooks and learned safe techniques for picking up bearded dragons, blue-tongued skinks, and red-footed tortoises. Hissing cockroaches and prickly stick insects offered another challenge, helping students build confidence in handling smaller invertebrates.

Alongside these practical sessions, the group enjoyed a quick tour of the zoo where the kookaburra, a baby skunk, and the free-roaming Soay sheep and alpacas all proved popular. Staff guided students with expert advice, explaining not just how to handle each animal safely but why these techniques are so important. Every student had the chance to participate, developing both skills and respect for the animals in their care. It was a memorable and hands-on introduction to their zoo placements, and with their next session focusing on birds and falconry, the students are already eager for the chance to handle an owl.

1-1 Work

1-1 work has continued since the return to school in September I have completed a number of assessments and begun work with young people as a result of these referrals. Our 1-1 work focusses on skills to help manage low mood or anxiety and is typically delivered in school over 6-8 weeks. I attend Kings every Tuesday to complete this work.



Your Practitioner:

Hi, I'm Callum, from the Mental Health Support Team (MHST) working within The Kings Church of England Academy.

I am an Education Mental Health Practitioner (EMHP) and my role involves supporting young people and their families with mild to moderate mental health challenges using Low Intensity Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (LICBT). Together we work to identify and address difficult emotions and feelings.

I work in partnership with the school's Mental Health Lead to deliver a whole school approach to mental health; this includes educational workshops, groups, and training to reduce the stigma of mental health and improve outcomes for the whole school community.

QUICK TIPS FOR BETTER SLEEP

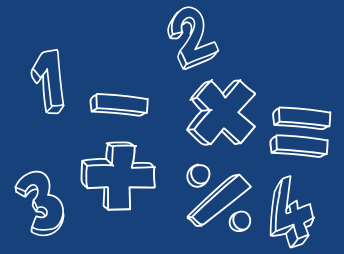
- HAVE A ROUTINE**
Knowing what to expect and following the routine makes for an easier transition to bedtime.
- GO TO BED AT THE SAME TIME**
Going to bed and getting up at the same time creates a sleep cycle that your body gets used to. It does it that way!
- DO SOMETHING QUIET**
Doing an activity that quiets your body and your mind gets you ready to sleep. Try meditation, journaling, reading or coloring.
- REMOVE ELECTRONICS**
The light from screens and sounds from notifications can disturb sleep. Place a charging station in a main area of the house instead of in the bedroom.
- LIMIT SCREEN TIME**
Blue light from screens can keep you from getting tired. As well as the constant need to see what's happening on social media or the next episode of your favorite show.
- USE SLEEP ENHANCERS**
Light, noise, and anxiety can keep you awake. Try products that help with these to fall asleep faster and get a more restful night's sleep. Try room-darkening curtains, white noise machines or a diffuser.

Everyone's Different

Everyone is different and every night's sleep is different. For adults usually 7 to 10 hours sleep is regarded as acceptable.

For school aged children anything between 7 and 12 hours sleep is fine, for teens between 7 and 11 hours. If you don't feel sleepy during the day then you're probably getting the right amount of sleep.

Don't compare your sleep needs to those of your friends. One size doesn't fit all! Having a plan that works for you is more important than having one plan fits all approach.

Pioneers is our Maths Enrichment Club for Years 7 to 9, where students explore the fun, creative side of mathematics! We love playing games like Dobble and even design our own versions. Rubik's cubes of all shapes and sizes are a regular feature at our sessions, keeping our minds sharp and our hands busy.

At the start of this term, Pioneers created a series of code breaking challenges for visiting Year 6 students. To crack the codex, they had to measure angles, use all four operations, apply shift ciphers, and complete tangram puzzles to uncover the missing letters. It was a fantastic mix of logic, teamwork, and creativity, showing just what Maths is all about.

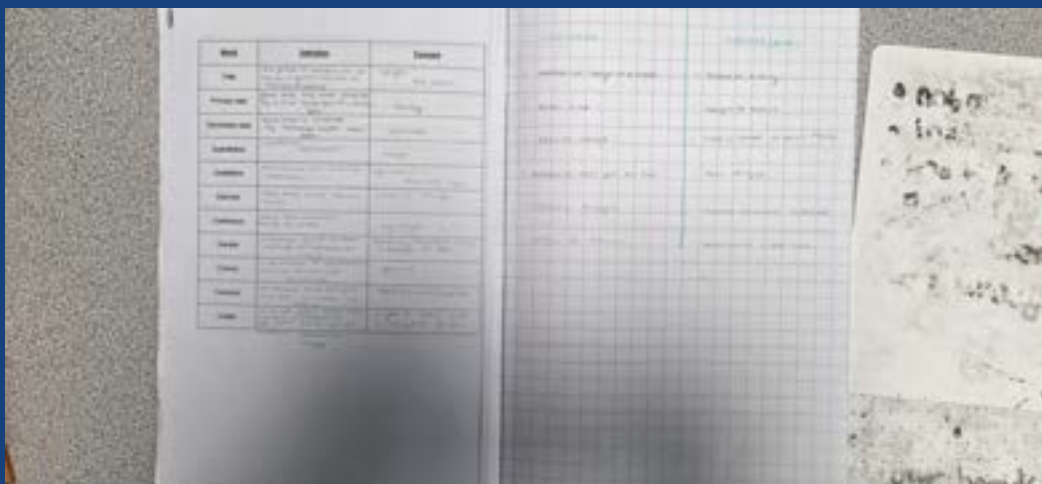

Statistics Course Launch for Year 8 and Year 9 Pupils

This academic year, pupils in Years 8 and 9 have embarked on our inaugural Statistics course, running alongside their regular Mathematics lessons. The course began with an exploration of the different types of data that can be analysed, followed by an introduction to random and nonrandom sampling, including their respective advantages and disadvantages.

As the course progresses, pupils will work towards achieving a GCSE in Statistics in addition to their GCSE in Mathematics. This dual qualification will not only strengthen their analytical and problem solving skills but also equip them to critically interpret data and make informed decisions in real world contexts, essential skills for thriving in today's increasingly digital and data driven world.

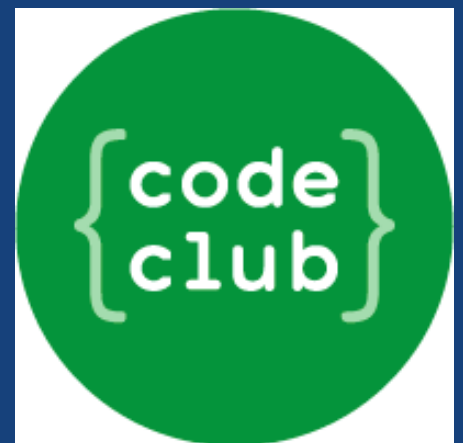

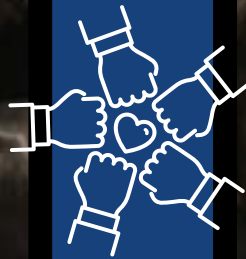
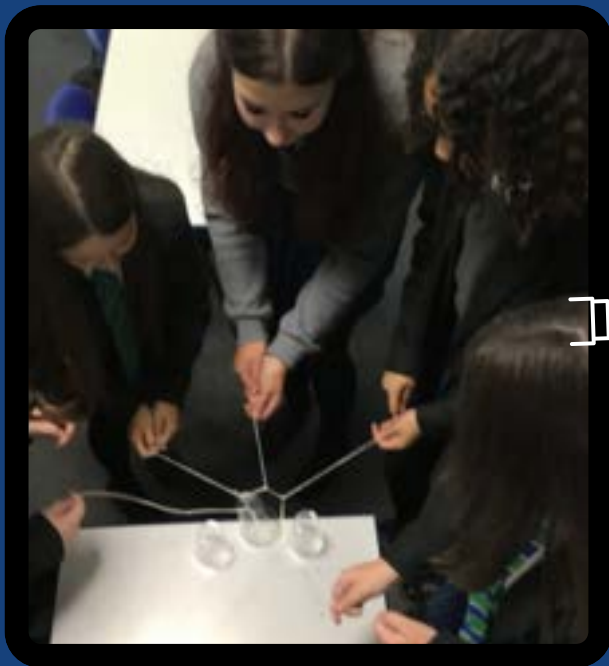


Wellbeing Hub

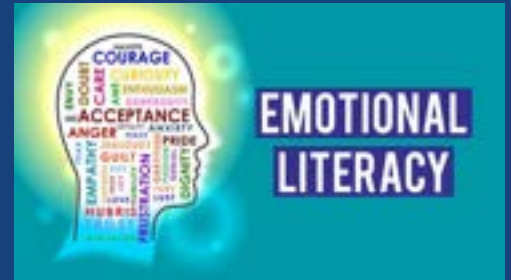

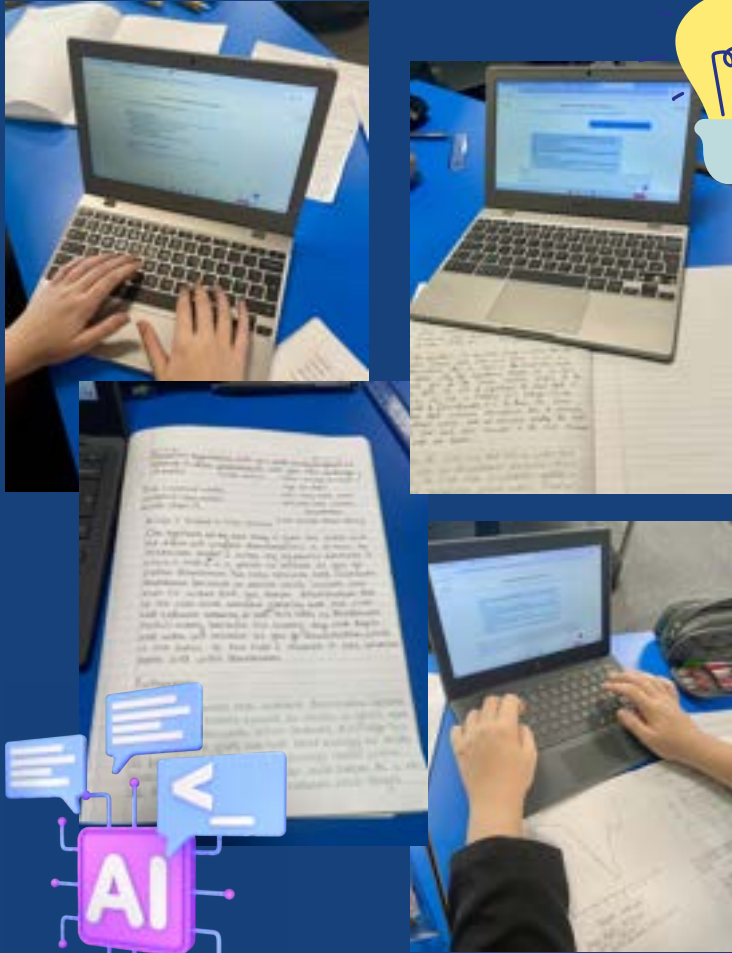
